I had not seen this but I am aware of these issues and currently Richard Garnett and Christophe Gustin are working behind the scenes with the UK government with the FFES study, which looked at farm families and pesticide exposures, which is applicable to these residents and bystanders.

The last article by the activist..Georgina Downs is typical of what we all see...she states:

"Many pesticides have neurotoxic, carcinogenic and hormone-disrupting capabilities. Studies have shown that very low doses of pesticides can disrupt hormone systems at levels significantly lower than previous research stated was safe. (Hayes et al ., 2002, Hayes et al ., 2003)"

The Hayes references are about his work on frogs with atrazine.

The piece below from CLA is what Syngenta thinks about Hayes:

Syngenta's Sherry Ford wrote the editor of Meister's Crop Protection Handbook Newsletter to express her disappointment in publishing the article, "Pesticides Contribute To Amphibian Decline" in the February edition of Handbook NOW.
